



Escaping the Streets: A Sex Trade Education Seminar

Presenters: Registration:	Natasha Falle, Founder and Director of SEXTRADE 101 was lured into the sex trade industry at the age of 15. Natasha trafficked for almost 10 years across Canada. Since her escape, she has graduated from both college and university, and has helped hundreds of others to break free from the destructive life of prostitution. She is the Founder and Director of SEXTRADE101, an activism organization which seeks to promote public awareness and education, and assists in policy and legislation change. <i>Bridget Perrier, Speaker of SEXTRADE 101</i> , is an Ojibway woman from Thunder Bay who was a sex trade worker and now works for SEXTRADE101. At 8 years of age, Bridget was sexually abused by a family friend and by 12 she had been lured into prostitution. She was bought and sold in brothels all over Canada. Bridget found healing within Toronto's First Nations community and eventually went back to school. In 2006 she was the recipient of the YWCA Woman of Distinction Turning Point award. Bridget speaks from a First Nations perspective regarding the affects and harm of prostitution on Canada's First Nations women.
